Currently, Kandlbinder is working on the Summer Reading Program, come into the library and sign up anytime, that runs through June and July. This year's theme is "Dig into Reading." For the month of July there will be no story time for the first week, but the library gets back on track the next week with "Get Down and Dirty", then "Rocks", and finally with "Ants."

Besides story time, children also can look forward to meeting "Babaloo", a one-man musical comedy act performing with his usual high energy. Guaranteed to be a good time at the library on June 11! Next up is a visit from Clifford the Big Red Dog on July 19 at 10am.

"Anyone can come in at any time to sign up for the summer reading program," said Kindlbinder, who also visits the schools in the MVR-III School District during the school year to read to the children. "Everyone will have a chance to win tickets to a Cardinals game, Six Flags tickets, tickets to Meramec Caverns, to the City Museum or a five pound Hershey's candy bar. We're excited to bring these programs to the community and we hope it shows when we put them on."

For the adults, Scenic Regional Library, recently hired Natale LaPlante. Before starting at the library Natale was volunteering at the Washington Historical Society and before that she was teaching English in South Korea. In the four months she has been working at the Pacific location Natale has begun an Adult Book Club. They've already read the "Joy Luck Club" by Amy Tan and are ready to begin "Secret Garden."

She has also implemented several special events for adults.
