Library Awarded Second Historical Newspaper Digitization Grant


The Library, in cooperation with the State Historical Society of Missouri and other genealogical and historical societies in the area, has been awarded its second historical newspaper digitization grant to digitize its historical local newspapers on microfilm. The grant covers 100% of the \$22,007 project. Once digitized, anyone will be able to search the newspapers online with a simple keyword search. The grant project is expected to be completed by December 2014. The library hopes to obtain additional grants to digitize the remainder of its collection over the next two years. Missouri Evergreen Requests Up 20% Over the Past Month

In March alone nearly 1,000 items were shipped to or from Scenic Regional Library by Missouri Evergreen member-libraries. This was a 20% increase from February. The consortium now has 18 member-libraries and over 305,000 items. The most recent library to join was the Sullivan Public Library, which went live on April 28.

Library Seeking Adult Literacy Tutors



Adult literacy is a growing problem in the United States. According to a recent U.S. Department of Education survey, 32 million U.S. adults—or 1 in 7—can't read. That means they can't read the menu at a restaurant or the instructions on a bottle of medication

While most people think of a fitness center when they hear someone mention the YMCA, adult literacy has been a major initiative of the organization throughout its history. The Four Rivers YMCA in Washington, which serves Franklin, Gasconade, and southern Warren counties, has been recruiting volunteers to provide free one-on-one literacy tutoring for the adults. Currently, the organization has over 25 tutors working with adults in the area. They provide 30 adults with approximately 75 hours of tutoring each month. Half of the adult students are learning English as a second language. Scenic Regional Library has been working with the YMCA to recruit tutors and provide locations for the tutoring sessions. Additional volunteers are needed in every community in the three-county area; however, the need is particularly great in Gasconade County. All tutors are required to complete six hours of training and complete a background check. The next tutor training sessions are held once a week at a public place, such as a Scenic Regional Library branch, the YMCA, or senior citizen centers.



E-reader Checkout Program Considered a Success

57 New Bestselling Fiction Titles Added

Scenic Regional Library began a pilot program on February 1 at its Hermann and Owensville Branches that allowed patrons to check out Kindle e-readers. The devices are pre-loaded with e-book versions of fifteen bestselling hardcover fiction novels. The program has been considered a success. The six e-readers were checked out a total of 27 times over a 12-week time period.

Patrons can request and check out the e-readers like they do a book; however, the devices are only available to Hermann and Owensville Branch patrons during the pilot program. Three Kindle e-readers are available for request and check out at each location.

The library plans to make Kindle e-readers available at all its branches in January 2015.
