Library Named Union Chamber of Commerce's Non-Profit of the Year

The library was named the Union Chamber of Commerce's 2015
Non-Profit of the Year. Chamber Director Aimee Frey announced the winners of the awards on October 19. The library will accept the award at the Chamber's annual end-of-the-year banquet on November 5 at Union's city hall. The award was bestowed upon the library due to their expansion of services throughout the year, including the addition of adult outreach, expansion of service hours, and increase in programming and new materials. A.L.I.V.E. won the award in 2014.



Scenic Regional Library Named Missouri's Library of the Year for 2015

Steven Campbell, director of Scenic Regional Library, accepted the Missouri Library Association's 2015 Library of the Year award on October 1 in Kansas City at the organization's annual conference.

The library earned this distinction by successfully passing a tax levy increase last April, consolidating into a single district, expanding services throughout this year, and its recent merger with the

Sullivan Public Library. Scenic Regional Library serves over 142,000 residents in Warren, Gasconade, and Franklin Counties (excluding Washington), with branches in Hermann, Owensville, Warrenton, St. Clair, Pacific, New Haven, Sullivan, and Union. There are over 150 public libraries in Missouri. Last year's winner was St. Louis County Library.

Library Purchases Land in Owensville

The library purchased a one-acre lot in Owensville on October 14. The lot, located on the corner of Madison Avenue and Highway 19 across from Save-A-Lot, will be the site of the future Owensville branch. The lot is a subdivision of the property on which the former Owensville 3-5 Center was located. Library Board member Bob Niebruegge (Owensville) was previously a principal at the school.

Over the past eight months, the library has purchased land for future expansion in Warrenton (adjacent the existing facility), St. Clair (adjacent the existing facility), and Wright City. Property was donated to the library in New Haven. The library expects to close on property in Pacific within the next few weeks.





Books by Mail

Check Out Limits Removed/ Limit on Overall Items Increased

The library has removed check out limits on audiobooks on CD, music CDs, DVDs, and books. Previously, patrons could only have seven (7) audiobooks on CD, seven (7) music CDs, four (4) DVDs, and fifty (50) books checked out at a time.

Patrons can now have 100 items checked out on their card at any given time, regardless of format. This is particularly helpful to parents of small children who may want to check out several dozen picture books at a time. The change in policy is effective immediately.

In the past, lower check out limits were necessary because the library's new material budget was smaller. The library

didn't want a patron to wipe out an entire section of the library's collection.



Fall Book Sale Sets New Record

The library's annual Fall Book Sale was an enormous success. The systemwide sale brought in over \$8,000 in revenue for the first time. The previous high was \$7,700. The Hermann and St. Clair branches each broke the \$1,000 mark in sales for the first time.

Reading to Children Every Day Can Predict Future Learning

The first few years of life are critical to a child's brain development. Children rapidly learn language, often quadrupling the number of words they know between the ages of 1 and 2. Studies have shown that the number of words a child knows prior to entering kindergarten is predictive of future learning success. Parents should read aloud 15 minutes

each day to their child to grow vocabulary and knowledge.

Guide to Children's Books




Board – For infants and young toddlers, these books are often concept books (teaching colors, names of animals, identifying body parts, etc.), simple rhymes or counting games, very simple stories, or wordless books. They are printed on thick paperboard.


Easy – A picture book is a book in which the illustrations play a significant role in telling the story. Books average 32 pages with art on every page. Plots are simple and text is generally less than 1,000 words. The audience is kindergarteners, ages 5-6.



Easy Reader – These are for children just starting to read on their own in grades 1-2, ages 6-7. Most easy reader series are broken into several levels, starting in kindergarten and going through third grade, with text getting progressively more complex with each level. The books are smaller than Easy books, may have some illustrations, and may be broken into short chapters. They are approximately 32-64 pages long. Controlled vocabulary is used in grammatically simple sentences. Examples include Amelia Bedelia or other "I Can Read" books.


Chapter – These are for readers in grades 3-4, ages 8-9. The stories, sentence structure, and themes are more complex. The books are longer and can be up to 150 pages, broken into longer chapters. Examples are Amber Brown and Cam Jansen.





Tuvenile Fiction – For readers in grades 5-6, ages 9-11. Stories. sentence structure, and themes become increasingly complex and sophisticated and can revolve around multiple characters. Books are generally 150 pages and up, broken into longer chapters. Examples are The Lightning Thief and Harry Potter.

Iuvenile Nonfiction – Generally any book about a factual topic. Also included here are fairy tales, poetry, and graphic novels.



Young Adult – For readers in grades 7-12, ages 12-18. Stories and sentence structure are complex and sophisticated. Mature language and themes such as sex and violence are common. Examples are Twilight and The Fault in our Stars.
