good to us," she said.

The proclamation notes that since the library's founding in 1937, it has "strived to promote access to information, entertainment and lifelong learning" and joined the Scenic Regional Library system in 1959.

In 2014, Scenic Regional Library District taxpayers voted to move forward with expansion plans and "Agnes Meyer graciously stepped forward to donate land for the construction of a new branch library building," the proclamation states.

"Agnes Meyer's donation

enables Scenic Regional Library to fulfill its goals of improving and expanding library services in New Haven," it concludes, saying the governor does "hereby commend and thank Agnes Meyer for her generous gift to the library and the legacy she leaves to the town of New Haven."

Mrs. Meyer donated a vacant 1.5-acre tract on Douglas Street that she and husband Harold purchased decades ago when they expanded to a second Western Auto store on Highway 100.
