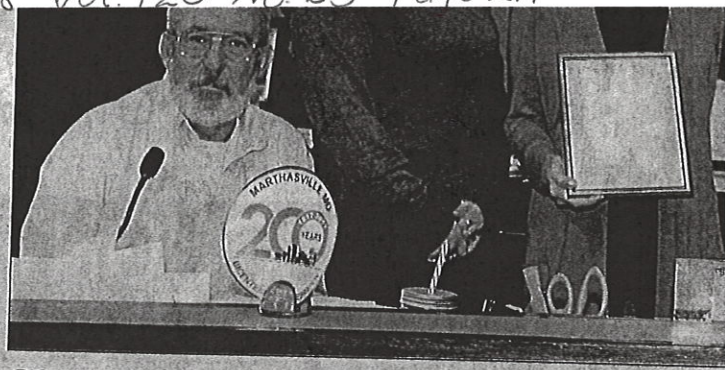

Pendleton, then in Marthasville a week after that, and then Sunday near Treloar.

Maragni said he raises mouflon sheep on his farm and sells them to ranchers. This 200-pound ram was at the farm less than two days before it escaped over a low spot in the fence of its pen (which has since been addressed).

Although the sheep are raised in captivity, Maragni said they are more like wild animals than domesticated livestock.

"You're not going to be able to walk up to it and put a lasso around its neck. If you do, you better hold on, because he's going to go nuts," Maragni commented just hours before finally tracking the sheep to Wentzville.

He said he received several calls from the Wentzville area Tuesday, Oct. 16. Maragni said

the final tip brought him to the Interstate 70 South Outer Road around 5 p.m. Tuesday, where he located and recaptured the animal.

Left on its own, and in the absence of any predator, Maragni said the ram could have survived indefinitely in the wild. He guessed the animal wandered across such a wide area because it was lost and didn't know where to go.

Maragni said his main concern was preventing the ram from doing any property damage, especially by getting hit by a vehicle. To that end, Maragni had said he wouldn't object to someone capturing the ram by any means necessary.

In the weeks that the ram was on the loose, word of it spread to many Marthasville-area residents through social media, with photos being shared whenever it was sighted. But few people could get close to the animal.

Presentation about domestic violence
