### Warren County R-III School District

Three people are competing for two seats on the R-III Board of Education this April.

Current officeholders Ginger Schenck and Allan Dreyer are running again for the board. They are joined by Joe Lanigan, who currently is a paraprofessional with the school district.

### Warrenton Fire Protection District

Three seats on the Warrenton FPD Board of Directors are up for election. Two of the seats are for six-year terms. The third seat is for the remaining two years of an unexpired term.

Current board member Malissa Booth is the sole candidate running to finish the two-year unexpired term.

Incumbents Jim Sharp Booth and Donald Owenby are seeking re-election to retain their two seats on the board for six-year terms. They are joined on the ballot by Robert Vogelgesang, who is also seeking a six-year term.

Board members for the fire protection district are elected at-large. The two people who get the most votes out of those three candidates will fill the two open six-year seats.

### Warren County Ambulance District

Two seats on the ambulance district's board of directors will be determined in April, each with a three-year term. In the ambulance district's Subdistrict 3, Jill Smoot is the sole candidate

for the board. In Subdistrict 6, Merlyn F. Petersmeyer is the sole candidate.

### Wright City

One board of aldermen seat for each of Wright City's two wards is on the ballot in April. Incumbent Aldermen Kerry Lambright, Ward 1, and Nathan Rohr, Ward 2, are both running for re-election unopposed.

### Wright City R-II School District

The board of education in Wright City has two seats up for election. Incumbent board of education members Mary Groeper and Austin Jones are seeking another term. New candidate Dustin Ferrell has also joined the race for the board.

The two candidates who receive the most votes in April will be elected to the school board.

### City of Marthasville

Marthasville is the town with the most activity on election ballots this April, with challengers running against the mayor and both aldermen up for re-election.

Mayor David Lange is seeking another term in office. He is challenged by David Edgington.

East Ward Alderman Dan Grafrath is seeking re-election. Running against him is Keith Theissen, who narrowly lost the election for East Ward alderman in 2018.

West Ward Alderman Leo Meyer is also seeking re-election. He is challenged by Keith Hagedorn.

### Marthasville Community Ambulance District

Marthasville Ambulance's Board of Directors has two seats up for election, representing two subdistricts. For

Subdistrict 3, Glen Biek is the only candidate seeking a position on the board. Subdistrict 6, Tracy Heister is the sole candidate.

### Washington School District

Two newcomers are seeking two open seats on Washington School Board. Jason Oesterly and Mattson, both of Washington, are the sole candidates for the two school board seats. Men are parents of children in the school district.

Current school board members Dan Contarini and Tom Mitchell, both of Washington, have decided not to seek another term.

### City of Truesdale

The offices of mayor and two aldermen will be voted on in April.

History teacher Jerry Cannon has thrown his name to compete for a position on the Truesdale Board of Aldermen. Members of Truesdale board are elected at-large meaning Cannon will compete with both current aldermen, Stanley Brookshier and Robert Green, for two seats on the board. The people who get the most votes will be elected.

Truesdale Mayor Chris Watson is running for election unopposed.

### Village of Innsbrook

Five people are vying for three open positions on village's board of trustees. Newcomers Cynthia Boyer and Donna West will join incumbents Jeffery Thomas Trish Dunn and Jerry Russell on the April ballot.

Members of the board of trustees are elected at-large. The top three people with the most votes will be elected to the board.
