The sign was installed on May 29 by Ziglin Signs of Washington in front of the library, along Highway 19. It's expected to be fully-operational in early June.

The branch will use the sign to publicize upcoming programs and events. The Owensville branch is the only Scenic Regional Library facility with a digital sign. It can be updated wirelessly by the branch staff.

The group also sold close to 100 donor wall "books" — also more than any other Friends group in the library system.

the name of an individual, organization, or business, and placed permanently in the branch's entrance hallway. They were sold for \$100, \$200, or \$300, depending on the size of the gift.
