

Owensville Branch Opens Community Garden – Check Out a Raised Bed!

The Owensville branch will open a community garden on Monday, April 14. The garden, located behind the branch, features ten raised beds for vegetables, flowers, and herbs. The garden beds, soil, and supplies were purchased with a Federal grant from the Department of Social Services through the University of Missouri Extension Family Nutrition Education Program. Volunteers filled the beds with topsoil and compost on March 25.





The garden beds can be "checked out" for the entire growing season by individuals, as well as organizations such as Scouts and 4-H groups, school classes, food pantries, and church groups. There are no costs or fees for "checking out" a garden bed. The library offers some gardening tools for use in the community garden for individuals who do not have them.

To "check out" a garden bed, a copy of the library's Community Garden User Agreement must be signed and returned to the branch. It outlines the rules for people utilizing the garden. 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

Missouri House Bill Could Have Major Impact on Local Library Funding

A bill was passed by the Missouri House in mid-March that would reduce personal property taxes over the next three years. Currently, personal property taxes in Missouri are determined based on one-third of market value. House Bill 903 would reduce that to 18% of market value over three years.

What does this mean for our library? Currently, over

25% of the library's revenue is derived from personal property taxes. If the bill were to pass the Senate, our library would lose an estimated \$222,000 in revenue the first year; \$444,000 in the second year; and \$667,000 in the third year, as well as each subsequent year.

The losses in revenue would result in significant cuts to library services. Funding for public schools and other taxing districts would also be negatively impacted by the legislation.

HB 903 has moved to the Missouri



Senate. It will need to be passed by the Senate and signed by Governor Kehoe to become a law.

Secretary of State Announcement on Overdrive Does Not Impact the Library

In March, Missouri Secretary of State Denny Hoskins announced withdrawal of state funding for Overdrive following allegations regarding inappropriate materials accessible to minors. The decision does not affect access to Scenic Regional Library's digital materials. Patrons can continue borrowing from



Overdrive's Libby, Kanopy, and Hoopla. The platforms are all funded locally and include parental controls or audience filtering options.

The Secretary of State's announcement related to state funds used to provide digital content (magazines, building blocks books, beginning readers, early readers, and other titles) for the MOREnet Shared Digital Collection, which is used by a consortium of Missouri public schools.

Federal Library Funding in Question



In late March, the entire staff of the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) was placed on leave for three months. The agency distributes Federal funds to state libraries, which use them to fund statewide initiatives and provide direct

grants to libraries. In Missouri, over \$3.3 million in Federal grant funds are provided to the Missouri State Library each year.

Some IMLS staff are expected to return, and the move did not eliminate Federal funding for libraries. However, with the dramatic changes at the agency, it is unclear if Congress will reauthorize those funds in September 2025.

A major reduction or elimination of IMLS funds would have a significant impact on the library. While we don't receive direct operating revenue from IMLS, the funds are used to subsidize some library expenses. IMLS funds are used to subsidize the library's Missouri Evergreen membership fees. Without subsidies, these fees would increase by 73%. In addition, the increase may force many smaller libraries to leave, which will raise Scenic Regional's fees even higher. The library borrows over 50,000 items a year from other Missouri Evergreen libraries.

IMLS funds are also used to subsidize the statewide courier service that transfers materials between Missouri libraries. Every library in Missouri receives two free days of courier service each week. For many smaller libraries, that's their only courier service. Obviously, if they can no longer transfer materials between their library and other libraries, remaining in Missouri Evergreen is pointless. So, even if they can afford increased Missouri Evergreen fees, if they can't afford courier, they will need to leave the consortium anyway. If enough smaller libraries are forced to leave, increased fees aren't the only concern; it's not inconceivable that the consortium could completely collapse.

Nearly all the grants we receive are funded through IMLS, too. Currently, the library has a grant funded through IMLS for art classes at the Gallery in Hermann. Due to the situation at IMLS, payment for the grant is frozen. Our current self-check systems, which are aging out, were funded through IMLS grants. The library is in the process of applying for replacement systems. The library's current servers were funded through these grants, too.

Library Seeking Service Organizations to Donate AED Devices

The library has been slowly adding Automated External Defibrillator (AED) devices at its branches through donations from community organizations and other entities. The portable devices are used to analyze a person's heart rhythm and deliver an electrical shock, or defibrillation, if necessary to restore a normal heartbeat. They are intended to help people experiencing sudden cardiac arrest.

The AED devices can be used by anyone in the vicinity and give the user step-by-step instructions. The devices are mounted on the wall in each branch's entrance hallway, which allows them to be used after hours by groups using the public meeting rooms.

On March 26, The Pacific Eagles donated \$2,021 to the library for the

purchase of an AED device for the Pacific branch. The St. Clair Lions Club are in the process of purchasing an AED for their local branch. The City of Union has tentatively agreed to purchase an AED device for the Union branch using their next disbursement of opioid settlement funds.

The library already has AED devices at the Owensville and Hermann branches. The Owensville Lions Club and Hermann Ambulance District each purchased an AED device for their local branch.

1st – "The Housemaid is Watching," by Freida McFadden - Millie, now a social worker, moves with her husband Enzo and their two children to a suburban neighborhood, seeking a fresh start. Their new life takes a dark turn as they encounter unsettling neighbors, leading to a series of events that threaten their family's safety. The third installment in "The Housemaid series," set approximately fifteen years after the previous book. **Genres: Adult Fiction, Mystery, Suspense, Psychological Thriller, Crime**







- 9" x 3" book \$350


