St. Clair Branch Community Garden to Open in March

The St. Clair branch's Community Garden is set to officially open on March 21. The garden, which is located behind the branch, features fourteen 4' by 8' raised beds for vegetables and eight smaller beds for flowers and herbs. Individuals, organizations, and classrooms can "check out" a raised bed with a library card for a growing season.

In the spring of 2016, the St. Clair Farmer's Market expressed interest in the creation of a community garden. The library was in search of ideas for creating unique public spaces at their new facilities and thought that the community garden was a great fit for the branch.

In the summer of 2016, the First Baptist Church and United Methodist Church in St. Clair each donated a small tract of land (one-tenth of an acre) to the library for the purpose of constructing a community garden. The new St. Clair branch, which was renovated and expanded, opened in August 2018.

In 2019, the St. Clair branch Friends of the Library agreed to take on the project. Paula Dace, a member of the St. Clair branch Friends of the Library's governing committee and a Master Gardener, directed construction of the garden and provided many hours of volunteer labor. Local landscaper Cozy Bailey, who owns Cozy by Nature, and her mother, Master Gardener Carolyn Cikovic, also volunteered their time to help create the garden. Bill Snow, the library's Facilities Manager, constructed the beds, installed the fencing, and is in the process of building a pergola and bench in the garden. In addition to paying for the lumber, the Friends group covered the cost of the mulch, liners, topsoil, and a motion-activated spotlight.

People interested in "checking out" a raised bed in 2020 must attend an informational meeting at the St. Clair branch on Saturday, February 22, at 2:00 PM.



Library Now Offers 3,500 Digital Magazine Titles

The library has offered digital magazines (e-magazines) for about five years. During that time, it has offered between 85 and 100 popular titles through the subscription. However, beginning January 1, RB Digital began including every title they offer for a flat fee which is less than the library's previous subscription. As a result, patrons can access all 3,500 Zinio digital e-magazines (domestic and foreign titles).

The e-magazines are full-color digital versions of the same exact content people would find in the print magazines in the store, and they're released at the same time as the print issue. Once a patron downloads an issue, they can keep it forever. Patrons can access the e-magazines using a desktop on the library's website, or with the free RB Digital app.



Central Elementary Classes Visit Union Branch

In January, students from Central Elementary School in Union visited the new branch for the first time. Thirty-five classes (over 700 students) from kindergarten to third grade planned to visit the branch on January 14, 16, 23, and 30. Due to a snow day on January 23, 1st grade will visit in March.

The visits included a thirty-minute tour of the branch, followed by thirty minutes in the library's mobile STEM lab, which was set up in the branch's public meeting rooms. The STEM lab contains a wide variety of robotics, as well as a recently-added augmented reality feature. Most of the STEM lab equipment was purchased in 2018 through a grant awarded by the Missouri State Library.

The visits were coordinated by Central Elementary Principal Leslie Lause and the library's Youth Services Librarian Christy Schink. The school district provided transportation from the school to the library.

The Friends of the Library Committees organize annual membership drives, operate the branch's book sales, hold fundraising events, and decide how to donate their funds to their local branch.





Staff Picks

"Seinfeldia: How a Show About Nothing Changed Everything," by Jennifer Keishin Armstrong

Armstrong teaches the reader how a T.V. sitcom is made start to finish, and everything in between. Have you ever repeated the lines "No Soup for You," "Festivus for the rest of us," or "Serenity now?" If so reading this book is a must. There are so many interesting facts and trivia woven into the story including how comedians Larry David and Jerry Seinfeld dreamt up their show about a group of friends living their lives in New York City. I have always loved the show and when I really love something I like to learn the thought and story behind the scenes. You will learn about how many of the episodes were based on real events, the planning behind each episode, the rewriting over and over to get it just right, and the tons of thought that went into every episode. I especially loved the chapter about "Festivus." Armstrong's writing style is an easy, fun, quick read.

"Kingdom of the Blind," by Louise Penny

Frankly, I love Chief Inspector Armand Gamache and I've talked to other readers who feel the same. He is the main character in Louise Penny's series of mysteries set in Quebec. Kingdom of the Blind is the first book Penny has written since the death of her husband who was the real-life model for Gamache. After his death, she thought that she would never write again. But slowly, Kingdom of the Blind came to life on her computer and was published in 2018.

Gamache responds to a mysterious invitation to a deserted farmhouse. He arrives during a snowstorm and learns that he and two others were named executors of the will of an eccentric cleaning woman.

Books in the Inspector Gamache series usually have two cases running concurrently to imitate life, where there is never only one thing happening at a time. The second story in Kingdom of the Blind takes place on the streets of Montreal where a new, deadly, illicit drug is about to make an appearance.

The reader follows Gamache as he and his team work out the white-collar crime behind one case and the backstreet dealing behind the other. Always in the background, and sometimes on the page, are the residents of the small village of Three Pines where there are warm fires, good food, and non-judgmental friendships. Armand and Reine-Marie, his wife, live there. If winters in Three Pines weren't so brutal, I'd like to live there, too.
