
2025 Community Read Kickoff on March 24

Scenic Regional Library, Washington Public Library, and East Central College will launch their fifth annual community read on Monday, March 24, by distributing free copies of this year's featured book, "The Flower Sisters," by Michelle Collins Anderson.

The historical fiction novel was inspired by the true story of the Bond Dance Hall explosion in West Plains, Missouri, on April 13, 1928.

The library and its partners will host a variety of programs throughout April centered around the themes of the book, including book discussions at every branch.

Michelle Collins Anderson, who was raised on a farm outside of West Plains and currently lives in St. Louis, will also be visiting three branches in April to discuss the book as part of the community read programming:

Owensville Branch Installs AED Unit

defibrillator) device on January 13. An AED device is a medical device that analyzes the heart's rhythm and delivers an electric shock to help restore a normal rhythm. The \$1,600 device was donated by the Owensville Lions Club and installed in December. It was installed in the branch entrance corridor so that groups using the meeting room after hours could access the device in the event of a medical emergency.

Currently, only the Hermann and Owensville branches have AED devices. The St. Clair Lions Club has approved the donation of an AED device for the St. Clair branch, but it hasn't been received and installed yet. The library is working toward identifying a service organization in each community willing to donate an AED device for their local library branch.



Improve Your Health: Read 30 Minutes a Day

Most people read for enjoyment, while others read to learn. These are certainly excellent reasons to pick up a book, but they might not be the most significant. Did you know that reading can actually improve your health and help you live longer?

The health benefits of reading have been well-documented.



A 2009 study by the University of Sussex found that six minutes of reading can reduce stress levels by 68%--more than taking a walk or listening to music. Stress reduction has an enormous benefit for people suffering from mental health problems such as anxiety and depression. The same study showed that reading 30 minutes can lower blood pressure and heart rate.

While screen time before bed has been shown to result in poor sleep quality, reading has proven to have the opposite effect. A 2021 study published by the National Institutes of Health (NIH) found that reading in bed before falling sleep improved overall sleep quality and helped people stay asleep.

Unsurprisingly, reading also keeps someone's brain active and prevents cognitive decline. A 2014 study published in Neurology, the American Academy of Neurology's medical journal, suggested that reading helped prevent or delay the onset of dementia and Alzheimer's disease by helping to keep a person's memory and thinking skills intact.

Better health also leads to longevity. A 2016 study by researchers at the Yale University School of Public Health showed that people who read at least 30 minutes a day lived 20% longer than those who didn't. Another study, published in the journal Social Science and Medicine, found that people who read up to 3-1/2 hours a week were 17% less likely to die over a 12-year period.

One or two studies can be an outlier, but when there are dozens and dozens of studies drawing the same conclusion, it's more than a coincidence. There's clearly an enormous link between reading and improved health and longevity.

It doesn't matter whether you read graphic novels, westerns, romances, biographies, or books about World War II. It also doesn't matter if you download them, check them out from the library, buy them, or borrow them. What matters is that you read. It's one of the most enjoyable ways to improve your health.

Check Out a Raised Bed in the St. Clair Branch Community Garden

The Community Garden at the St. Clair branch will officially open for the 2025 season on Monday, March 3. The garden, located behind the branch, features fourteen 4' by 8' raised beds for vegetables and eight smaller beds for flowers and herbs. Garden beds can be "checked out" for the entire growing season by individuals, as well as organizations such as Scouts and 4-H groups, school classes, food pantries, and church groups.

To "check out" a garden bed, a copy of the library's Community Garden User Agreement must be signed and returned to the branch. It outlines the rules for people utilizing the garden. The agreement can be found online at https://scenicregional.org/gardenagreement/. There are no costs or fees for "checking out" a garden bed. The library offers some gardening tools for use in the community garden for individuals who do not have them.

In the spring of 2016, the St. Clair Farmer's Market expressed interest in the creation of a community garden. The library was in search of ideas for creating unique public spaces at their new facilities and thought that the community garden was a great fit for the branch.

In the summer of 2016, the First Baptist Church and United Methodist Church in St. Clair each donated a small tract of land (one-tenth of an acre) to the library for the purpose of constructing a community garden. The new St. Clair branch, which was renovated and expanded, opened in August 2018.

In 2019, the St. Clair branch Friends of the Library agreed to take on the project. Paula Dace, a member of the St. Clair branch Friends of the Library's governing committee and a Master Gardener, directed construction of the garden and provided many hours of volunteer labor. Local landscaper Cozy Bailey, who owns Cozy by Nature, and her mother, Master Gardener Carolyn Cikovic, also volunteered their time to help create the garden. Bill Snow, the library's Facilities Manager, constructed the beds, installed the fencing, and is in the process of building a pergola and bench in the garden. In addition to paying for the lumber, the Friends group covered the cost of the mulch, liners, topsoil, and a motion-activated spotlight.

The Community Garden was opened in 2021 after a delay due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Patrons from the Union branch went off-site to learn about making maple syrup with Walter Conner. Each participant went home with a small jar of fresh syrup to enjoy.





Used All-in-One Printers for Sale

The library is selling six (6) Canon imageCLASS MF525dw Wireless Black-and-White All-in-One Printers. They copy, scan, fax with a 50-sheet document feeder. They also have a 550-sheet paper tray, 100-sheet bypass, and a 150-sheet output tray. The printers are 19.5" wide, 18.3" deep, and 17.8" high. They print up to 45 ppm and have wireless and mobile printing capability.

The printers were purchased in 2018 and are in good condition, ideal for a small business or organization. They are \$100 each. For more information, contact



"Under the Surface" by Diana Urban

What could possibly go wrong on a senior trip? Diana Urban answers this question with a vicious twist: absolutely everything. She weaves a ghastly story that will have you in complete shock. While on their senior trip to Paris, France, a group of teens gets invited to an (illegal) exclusive party. One that is being held underground, after dark, in the catacombs that run below Paris. Unfortunately for them, they never make it there, but rather end up getting lost in the tunnels. Instead of making their way back to the surface, they end up going deeper and deeper into the unknown. As they delve deeper, they discover that not everything is quite as it seems. Someone (or something) is chasing them and they're out for blood, attempting to pick off the teens one by one. Who's going to make it to the

surface alive? I devoured this book trying to answer that very question; I finished it in a day because I couldn't put this book down. If you're a fan of YA thrillers, with a hint of horror and romance, then this is the book for you. 10/10, you won't be able to set this book down until you've made it to the very end.





A novel about deep friendships and bold patriotism, "The Women" is a richly drawn story with a memorable heroine whose idealism and courage under fire will come to define an era. **Genres: Historical Fiction, Vietnam War, Romance, Feminism**


2nd – "A Calamity of Souls," by David Baldacci - Set in the tumultuous year of 1968 in southern Virginia, a racially charged murder case sets a duo of White and Black lawyers against a deeply unfair system as they work to defend their wrongfully accused Black defendants in this courtroom drama. **Genres: Historical Fiction, Mystery, Thriller, Crime, Legal Thriller**


3rd (tied) – "A Christmas by the Sea," by Melody Carlson - "A Christmas by the Sea" follows Sarah, a woman grieving the loss of her husband, who retreats to a coastal town in Maine for the holidays. There, she forms new connections, especially with a widowed innkeeper and her daughter, and begins to heal. Through the beauty of the sea and the kindness of others, Sarah rediscovers hope and the magic of Christmas. **Genres: Christmas, Romance, Christian Fiction, Contemporary Romance**

3rd (tied) – "The Guest," by B.A. Paris - "The Guest" is the story of Tara, a woman whose life is turned upside down when a mysterious stranger, named Jack, arrives at her home. Tara and her husband, Finn, reluctantly offer Jack hospitality, but as his presence lingers, unsettling events unfold. Tensions rise as secrets are revealed, and Tara begins to question Jack's true intentions, as well as her own perceptions of those around her. **Genres: Psychological Thriller, Mystery, Suspense, Crime**


