"The Scenic Regional Library is a good place to go, even if you aren't interested in reading," stated Miss Lucy Lomax, chief librarian for the Scenic Regional Library.

"Our reference department is available to anyone and a reference librarian is on hand to help you. You furnish the questions, and we'll find the answers," Miss Lomax stated.

She also pointed out that in addition to a large volume of fiction books, there are also available to borrowers, books on hobbies, long-play phonograph records, pamphlets and framed art prints.

Motion pictures, 16 mm. sound, and film strips are available for programs of groups and schools. Staff members of the library are also available to give book talks or to show films to organizations.

The Scenic Regional Library bookmobile makes regular scheduled stops in communities and at schools, with the schedule for the bookmobile being published weekly.

Libraries are located in New Haven, Owensville, Pacific, St. Clair, Union and Warrenton. The regional office in Union serves as a deposit and exchange center for books and materials which are available at all of the libraries.
