Winter Book BINGO Starts January 2

Looking for something to do in the cold winter months? Need some incentives to keep your kids reading this winter? Scenic Regional Library is having a Winter Book BINGO program in January and February for all ages. You can pick up a BINGO card at your local branch or do it all online by registering at

www.scenicregional.org/winterbingo. If you used our online system for this year's summer reading program, all you have to do is sign in on your computer or open the app on your phone and register for Adult/Teen Winter BINGO or Kids Winter BINGO, you won't need to create a whole new account.

Are there prizes? Of course there are prizes! You can earn up to 5 BINGOs on your BINGO card by completing all of the reading /activities on a line horizontally, vertically or diagonally. For each BINGO you'll receive a free book of your choice at your local branch. That's 5 free books you can earn just by reading and doing fun activities this winter. Winter Book BINGO ends on March 1st so be sure to turn in your BINGO card or complete all of your activities online by March 1st.

www.scenicregional.org/winterbingo. You can also find booklists that match the BINGO reading categories, just in case you are having trouble finding a book set in Missouri or a book with a number in the title. The Pacific branch's full-time adult programmer, Barb Schweissguth is retiring from the library on January 8. She began working part-time at the library in 2007. In 2011, Ms. Schweissguth was promoted to full-time, splitting her time between the Union and Pacific branches. In 2012, she began working full-time at the Pacific branch. In 2015, Ms. Schweissguth became the branch's adult programmer. She had also previously served as the branch's children's programmer. Library Offers Free Access to Digital Picture Books for Children

Adults and teens aren't the only people with digital options through the library during the pandemic. The library provides free access to the TumbleBook Library deluxe collection for children



in grades K-3. The collection includes more than 550 titles of animated talking picture books, books in English, French and Spanish, read-alongs, non-fiction books, and National Geographic videos.

TumbleBook Library provides unlimited viewings, so multiple children can read the same book at the same time. The books are streamed through the web page, not downloaded, and the audio can be turned on or off so that children can practice reading. TumbleBook Library can be used at home by patrons with their library cards. Visit https://scenicregional.org/kids/tumblebook on the library's website to access the TumbleBook Library.

Free Services Available for Missourians with Visual and Physical Disabilities

Wolfner Library, also known as Wolfner Talking Book and Braille Library, is a free library service for Missourians who are unable to use standard print materials due to a visual or physical disability. Materials are mailed to and from library patrons at their homes for free.



While Scenic Regional Library does offer books-by-mail service for homebound residents, as well as a large collection of audiobooks on CD and large print books, it does not offer Braille materials. It also does not have the enormous audiobook and large print collection found at Wolfner Library.

The Wolfner Library's collection includes over 360,000 fiction and non-fiction audiobooks, braille, and large print books for all ages. The library loans machines to those using their audiobooks. Over seventy magazine subscriptions are also available. Currently, over 11,000 Missourians actively use Wolfner Library. However, only 8% of residents living in Franklin, Gasconade, and Warren Counties who are eligible to use Wolfner Library's services are doing so.

An individual must complete an application and be certified by a medical professional, social worker, rehabilitation teacher, librarian, or other certifying authority, to receive services from Wolfner Library.

Library's Digital Resources See Big Surge in 2020

While the library's in-person traffic has been down since it reopened in June 2020, there's been a surge in digital usage. The library has seen usage of e-books, e-audiobooks, e-magazines, streaming video, and digital and streaming music, surge over 20%. The library offers its patrons access to tens of thousands of these digital resources. They can be checked out and downloaded for free with a library card and viewed or listened to on a Smartphone, tablet, desktop, and laptop. cloudLibrary: cloudLibrary provides the library's core digital collection with over 7,100 e-books and 3,400 eAudiobooks. cloudLibrary offers a browsing feature which allows users to create your own custom library and powerful search filters which allow users to only view available titles and browse by category. The platform is not compatible with MP3 players or Kindle Paperwhites.





Overdrive: OverDrive provides library users with thousands of eBooks and eAudiobooks for download. eAudiobooks can be played on MP3 players, iPods, iPads, Nooks, Kindles, and Smartphones. Apps are available for Android and iOS devices, including Overdrive's "one-step checkout" app called Libby.



Hoopla: Access to over 500,000 e-books, e-audiobooks, digital videos, and digital songs. All content is available streaming; some content is available to download for offline viewing, via the hoopla app. Patrons never have to place a request and wait for a title to be available.



Freegal: Freegal offers access to about 10 million songs, including Sony Music's catalog of legendary artists, and over 15,000 music videos. In total the collection is comprised of music from over 28,000 labels with music that originates in over 100 countries. There is no software to download, and there are no digital rights management (DRM) restrictions.



Rb digital magazines: Download digital versions of more than 3,500 magazines on an enormous range of subjects, including Cosmopolitan, Field and Stream, Car and Driver, ESPN, Guns and Ammo, Rolling Stone, and Harper's Bazaar. Please note that e-magazines can be downloaded onto mobile devices such as tablets, smartphones, and some eReaders. However, they can only be streamed on a pc or laptop.

classroom for students in kindergarten through college in over 60 academic subjects.

Tutors are available online every day from 2:00 PM to midnight. These certified online tutors will help your student work through math problems, edit their papers, and navigate many other academic challenges without having to leave home.

To access the service, students should visit www.scenicregional.org, and then click on Homework Help under the Kids or Teens tab. A library card will be required and you will need to set up an account the first time.




Santa visited our library virtually to read his favorite story. Afterward each family had a chance to share their screen side by side with Santa and take a screen shot.

Brontes Mistress FINOLA AUSTIN

"Bronte's Mistress," by Finola Austin

Readers know Charlotte Bronte, author of "Jane Eyre". Also popular is Emily Bronte's "Wuthering Heights." Less well known is the youngest sister,


Ann, who wrote two books that are still in publication today. The hope and focus of the family was the only son, Branwell. But Branwell couldn't establish himself in any job and died young of alcohol and drug abuse. He did work for a few years as tutor to the son of a family where his sister Ann was governess to the daughters. While there, he had a sexual relationship with the children's mother.

Lydia Robinson tells her story in a first person narrative. She is passionate and dissatisfied with her circumscribed life. Her complaints about her corset give a physical handle to the emotional strictures that are suffocating her. Lydia, however, is not perfect. She is selfish and shallow. I felt sympathy for her children who were ignored by a cold father and pushed away by a self-absorbed mother. Branwell Bronte, an inexperienced, much younger man, gave her the adoration and physical attention she no longer received from her husband.

The Author's Note at the end of the book explains that ALL of the characters in the book are real and details corroborating evidence for events in the book. No one can know for sure what happened at Thorp Green Hall but Finola Austin has made the residents very real and given us a window into what life was like in mid-nineteenth century England through the details of a historical tragedy.




"Lucky Man," by Michael J. Fox

The description of this television show intrigued me so I place it on hold, only to find out upon watching it that it is based on a book series.
