Freegal Will Receive New Update

Freegal users can expect an update to the popular download and streaming services app starting mid-January. The update will be called Freegal Music+, a music service with all the things you love about Freegal Music and some significant improvements to make your listening experience as easy and enjoyable as possible.



Freegal offers access to about 8 million songs and over 15,000 music videos. Users can enjoy up to eight hours of daily ad-free streaming and five weekly downloads.

Improvements will include AI-powered recommendations, a new user-friendly user interface, easier navigation, a complete redesign of the desktop and mobile apps, new genre pages for easier browsing, and much more.

Library Road Sign Installed in New Haven

Library directional signs have been installed on Highway 100 to point the way to the New Haven branch. Approving, purchasing, and installing the signs was a joint project of the New Haven City Council, MODOT, and Scenic Regional Library. The signs were installed on December 9.

The library has been working with MODOT and local municipalities to install "Library" road signs indicating where to find the library's buildings. Along with New Haven, Sullivan and Pacific also have already installed signs. All library locations can expect to see a sign installed in their community.



Foundation Will Host Trivia Night



“Lives Like Loaded Guns: Emily Dickinson and Her Family’s Feuds” by Lyndall Gordons

Like other nineteenth-century women writers, a myth has grown up about Emily Dickinson

that is only thinly based on reality.

Emily did live all of her life in Amherst and never married. She died at the age of fifty-five and did not leave the house for the last half of her life. Lyndall Gordon presents evidence that Emily suffered from epilepsy and suggests the illness was the reason that Emily stopped making out-of-town trips to visit family and friends.

Emily didn’t keep all of her poetry hidden from the world. She tried to get selected

poems published during her lifetime, and a few were reluctantly made public. Potential publishers shied away from them. The poems were not what readers were used to. They didn’t rhyme. They were powerful and not what was considered appropriate for women to write or to read. When poems were published after her death, the nay-sayers were proved wrong. Readers couldn’t get enough of them.


Emily was not meek and shy. She wrote with passion to both men and women acquaintances, craving their attention to her and to her writing. She did have a love interest who visited her frequently from his home in Boston.

Emily and her unmarried sister, Lavinia, lived in the family home until their deaths. Their brother, Austin, lived with his wife and two children in the house next door.

Emily and her sister-in-law, Susan, were close friends and Sue was Emily’s chosen first reader for many of her poems. Austin had an affair with a much younger married woman, Mabel, that lasted more than a decade until his death. After Emily’s death, there was a battle over who owned her poems, which were scattered between her house, her brother’s house, and some had even made their way to Mabel’s house, though Emily had refused to ever see Mabel.

“Lives Like Loaded Guns” is riveting reading for anyone interested in the view behind the curtain of a famous person’s life.

“I’m Glad My Mom Died” by Jennette McCurdy

I listened to the audiobook “I’m Glad My Mom Died” by Jennette McCurdy. It is a memoir narrated by the author. Some of

you may recognize the author’s name as that of the actress famous for her roles in the Nickelodeon sitcoms “iCarly” and “Sam and Cat,” which ran in the early 2000s. I remember those shows very well, especially “iCarly,” which was a global phenomenon for teens and tweens. What initially caught my attention, however, was the title of the book, which is pretty startling! The book deals with Jennette’s life as a reluctant child actress and singer and with her relationship with her mother, Debra McCurdy.

Debra was the very definition of a stage mother, defined as “a woman who manages her child’s acting or performing career, often in what is considered a detrimental and overbearing manner. “Jennette’s whole existence when she was young revolved around pleasing her mother. Debra was manipulative and physically, emotionally, and mentally abusive throughout their relationship, all under the guise of acting in “Jennette’s best interests.”

Due to overwhelming pressure and stress, Jennette developed severe eating disorders that plagued her throughout her childhood and into her late twenties.

The book is intense in the straightforward manner in which the author details her life and troubled relationships. I recommend it highly but not lightly.





“The Bodies of Others” by Dr. Naomi Wolf

As an author, columnist, professor, and CEO of a tech company, Dr. Wolf has a unique perspective into what occurred throughout 2020 – 2022. In “The Bodies of Others”, she documents how the COVID-19 pandemic and its subsequent restrictions are a direct attack on everything that makes us human. As a former political presidential campaign consultant and advisor to a US Vice-President, she describes how politicians react to and handle any crisis. As the CEO of a tech company, she explains this industry’s priorities and how the big tech companies have a vested interest in prolonging the restrictions and mandates. As an author, she has access to and gives a voice to the experts whose professional opinions have been silenced. Dr. Wolf blends these well-researched themes with her own personal observations and experiences of watching the communities around her disintegrate and of losing her friends and loved ones to the hatred fostered and rewarded by the “New Authoritarians.” As I read this book, I was brought to tears several times as the challenges she faced mirrored my own. “The Bodies of Others” is an emotionally difficult, but a critically important title to add to your list of books to read.

“The Sun Down Motel” by Simone St. James

I recently read “The Broken Girls” by Simone St. James and loved it, and decided I wanted to read some of her other books as well, so I picked up “The Sun Down Motel” with hopes of loving it just as much as the previous novel. Little did I know, I would be reading my favorite book of 2022! Simone St. James excels in writing two different timelines while parallel to the same story.

In Fell, New York, 1982, Viv Delaney is trying to move away from her past and towards a future in New York City. One night she stops at The Sun Down Motel to stay the night, and falls into taking a job as the night clerk. She decides to stay and live in Fell and continue working at the motel. But all is not well at The Sun Down Motel, and it’s not long before Viv begins to encounter its secrets.


In 2017, Carly Kirk has traveled to Fell, in search of her aunt Viv, who disappeared in November of 1982. Upon visiting the old motel, she soon discovers that nothing has changed, and takes the night clerk position, the same job her aunt held, to help her investigation along.

Throughout the novel, the two women unknowingly work in their own timelines to uncover a mystery that has haunted Fell for over three decades.


