

"All the Light We Cannot See" by Anthony Doerr (Historical Fiction), Published in 2014. 531 pages

Awards: Pulitzer Prize for fiction, Audie Award for fiction, ALA Alex Award

Themes: World War II, Holocaust, gems, radios, scale models

Summary: Marie-Laure lives in Paris near the Museum of Natural History, where her father works. When she is twelve, the Nazis occupy Paris and father and daughter flee to the walled citadel of Saint-Malo, where Marie-Laure's reclusive great uncle lives in a tall house by the sea. With them they carry what might be the museum's most valuable and dangerous jewel. In a mining town


in Germany, Werner Pfennig, an orphan, grows up with his younger sister, enchanted by a crude radio they find that brings them news and stories from places they have never seen or imagined. Werner becomes an expert at building and fixing these crucial new instruments and is enlisted to use his talent to track down the resistance. Deftly interweaving the lives of Marie-Laure and Werner, Doerr illuminates the ways, against all odds, people try to be good to one another.

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"Harry Truman's Excellent Adventure: The True Story of a Great American Road Trip" by Matthew Algeo (History Non-Fiction), Published in 2009, 238 pages

Themes: Harry Truman, memoirs, cars, road trips, U.S. presidents, regional food, New York City, Broadway

Summary: On June 19, 1953, Harry Truman got up early, packed the trunk of his Chrysler New Yorker, and did something no other former president has done before or since: he hit the road. No Secret Service protection. No traveling press. Just Harry and his childhood sweetheart Bess, off to visit old friends, take in a Broadway play, celebrate their wedding anniversary in the Big

Apple, and blow a bit of the money he'd just received to write his memoirs. Hopefully incognito. In this lively history, author Matthew Algeo meticulously details how Truman's plan to blend in went wonderfully awry. Fellow diners, bellhops, cabbies, squealing teenagers at a Future Homemakers of America convention, and one very by-the-book Pennsylvania state trooper all unknowingly conspired to blow his cover. Algeo revisits the Trumans' route, staying at the same hotels and eating at the same diners, and takes readers on brief detours into topics such as the postwar American auto industry, McCarthyism, the nation's highway system, and the decline of Main Street America. By the end of the 2,500-mile journey, you will have a new and heartfelt appreciation for America's last citizen-president.



"The One-in-a-Million Boy" by Monica Wood (Contemporary Adult Fiction), Published in 2016, 336 pages

Awards: Nautilus Award, New England Society Book Award, finalist for Book of the Year by The World magazine

Themes: Immigrants, intergenerational relationships, volunteerism, Ellis Island, family secrets

Summary: The incandescent story of a 104-year-old woman and the sweet, strange young boy assigned to help her around the house, a friendship that touches each member of the boy's unmoored family For years, guitarist Quinn Porter has been on the road, chasing gig after gig,

largely absent to his twice-ex-wife Belle and their odd, Guinness records-obsessed son. When the boy dies suddenly, Quinn seeks forgiveness for his paternal shortcomings by completing the requirements for his son's unfinished Boy Scout badge. For seven Saturdays, Quinn does yard work for Ona Vitkus, the wily 104-year-old Lithuanian immigrant the boy had visited weekly. Quinn soon discovers that the boy had talked Ona into gunning for the world record for Oldest Licensed Driver and that's the least of her secrets. Despite himself, Quinn picks up where the boy left off, forging a friendship with Ona that allows him to know the son he never understood, a boy who was always listening, always learning.



"The Rich Part of Life" by Jim Kokoris (Family Life Fiction), Published in 2001, 336 pages

Awards: Friends of American Writers Award for Best First Novel

Themes: Civil War, family, Greece, film making, cooking

Summary: Teddy Pappas is an eleven-year-old boy forced into maturity before his time. He lives with his younger brother and their eccentric Civil War historian father, a man more comfortable with discussing Confederate footwear than what kind of day his sons had. Their lives have been quiet for a year since the real lifeblood of their household, Teddy's mother, died in a tragic car accident. On the one-year anniversary of her death, Teddy's stoic father plays his wife's favorite lottery numbers

in a tender, uncharacteristic act. When it turns out that the family holds the \$190 million winning ticket, their world is instantly transformed. Seemingly overnight, a host of colorful characters demands their attention, including Teddy's hilarious aunt and uncle, a beautiful divorcée, a desperate former soap opera star, and a menacing stranger who threatens the very core of the family. As events spiral out of control, the family struggles to discover what "the rich part of life" really is. Featuring a unique father-child bond, Jim Kokoris's moving first novel is flavored with the rich characterizations and poignant charm of early John Irving. Creating the perfect balance of humor and pathos, Kokoris takes us on an unforgettable journey through the ups and downs of this revelation of unexpected wealth.

Donor Wall Books

Y ou can have your name, your family's name, or your business's name become a permanent part of the library in your community. The Scenic Regional Library Foundation and Friends of the Library groups have been selling donor wall "books" since construction on our new buildings began in 2016.

Due to increased



costs, the donor book prices have been increased \$50. A "book" that is 8" x 1.5" will now be \$150. A 10" x 2" book is \$250; and a 9" x 3" book is \$350. Proceeds from the sale of the donor wall books are used to assist the library with the purchase of furnishings and equipment in the new facilities. All purchases are tax deductible.

Funds raised from the donor wall books have been used to purchase instruments for the children's patios, performers for library programs, displays for board books, and much more.

Scent Kits Donated for Memory Kits

I he library recently received a donation of 60 scent kits from Dry Creek Bloodhounds. The scent kits will be included in the Memory Kits that the library circulates for caregivers of those experiencing memory loss. The scent kits include supplies and instructions for capturing a person's scent and storing it for use to help find them if they ever go missing. Caregivers will be able to take the scent kit from the Memory Kit and the library will replace it when the Memory Kit is returned.

Dry Creek Bloodhounds presented programs at five branches during our Community Read in March and April of this year. During the program they had the bloodhounds smell a patron, the patron hid, and then was found by the bloodhound. They explained during the program that their bloodhounds are used all over the country to find missing persons. Partnering with Dry Creek Bloodhounds to provide scent kits in our Memory Kits seemed like a great service for our community.

Monthly VR Clubs Coming Soon

The library purchased eight Meta Quest 2 headsets this year. Those headsets will be used for programming in the branches and for outreach programs. Starting in August, every branch will have a monthly Virtual Reality (VR) club. At VR Club, new and experienced players can sign up for a one-hour time slot to experience new worlds. For those new to VR, we have a game called First Steps that teaches you how to explore and play in VR in a simple, directed game format.

Once you have a little experience, you can try out our assortment of games. In Walkabout Mini Golf and Golf VR, you can play golf at your own level and pace in exciting landscapes. In Wander, you can go anywhere in the world. In Hand Physics Lab, you can solve puzzles using just your hands, no controllers. You can fish, ride roller coasters, or shoot aliens. The possibilities are nearly endless.


