

Community Read Will Kick Off March 11

The second annual Community Read is rapidly approaching, and the library has begun preparing for various programs to celebrate everyone reading *Walking with Peety* by Eric O'Grey at the same time.

The Community Read will start with a kick-off event Saturday, March 11. Stop by any branch to pick up your free copy of *Walking with Peety* and enjoy themed activities from 10 a.m. - 3 p.m. To involve all ages in the event, the library will also hand out copies of *The Trail* by Meika Hashimoto to teens, and *Madeline Finn and the Shelter Dog* by Lisa Papp to children.

After the kick-off, take the next week to read the book, and then get ready to enjoy fun, educational, and exciting programming for all ages. Beginning Monday, March 20, and continuing through the following four weeks, the library and its partners will present over 80 free programs focusing on animals and wellness throughout the three-county area (Gasconade, Franklin, and Warren).

Programming topics will include visits from the Incredible Purina Dog Show, a themed escape room, a pet photo class, multiple culinary classes, youth and adult yoga, a craft night, book discussions, Pound fitness classes, a hiking and backpacking informational program, an author event with Eric O'Grey, and more. Programs will vary by branch.

The programming will culminate with a final event titled "This Community Reads Culinary Show," - where author Eric O'Grey will showcase his culinary talents! Attendees can try samples and visit food and craft vendors between demonstrations. Library to Conduct Tornado Drill


The library will conduct a systemwide tornado drill on Wednesday, March 15, at 2 p.m. The public will be asked to relocate and remain in the designated shelter location until

Groups Can Now Schedule Collection Drives at the Library

Scenic Regional Library welcomes the opportunity to partner with organizations on collection drives in our communities. Past examples of drives held at the library include canned food and blankets for the Turning Point Domestic Violence Shelter, new or gently used coats for Warners' Warm-Up, essential hygiene products for Touch of Hope, and used sports equipment for Franklin County Youth Sports.

All collection drives must be approved by the Library Administration and should be scheduled six weeks in advance to allow information to be placed in the library newsletter. Systemwide drives will be given preference over drives limited to one branch. A collection drive should begin on the first day of the month and end on the last day of the month. Only one collection drive can occur at a branch at a time. The organization must provide the collection box with appropriate signage. Signage should be attached to the collection box and not the walls of the branch.

Driving Hope Seeking Volunteer Drivers and Dispatchers

CO-O DERVING HOPE Driving Hope is a new 501(c)3 nonprofit in Franklin County. The organization plans to launch a volunteer network to provide free transportation to victims of domestic violence. Currently, Driving Hope is recruiting volunteer drivers and dispatchers.

Transportation is probably the most overlooked issue related to domestic violence. A victim's abuser often takes away their car or car keys to control them. Once they leave their abusive situation and attempt to transition back to a normal life, they often don't have a vehicle. As a result, they cannot get to court appearances or appointments with an attorney, counselor, or doctor.

Currently, there are limited options for transportation in Franklin County. There is no public transportation and limited reliable taxi and ride-sharing services. Even if there were, many victims don't have any money because their abuser controls their finances or they lose their job while attempting to flee their abuser.

The most common way victims get to a shelter is by being given a ride by law enforcement. While law enforcement doesn't mind providing such transportation, it can take hours to transport a victim to a shelter in Rolla or St. Louis and certainly detracts from their other duties. It also doesn't address the need for transportation to court appearances, child visits, and counselor, medical, and attorney appointments. Law enforcement does not provide transportation for those types of trips. There have been many occasions where an agency has had to pay hundreds of dollars for a taxi from St. Louis to transport a victim from point A to point B in Franklin County—an extremely inefficient use of community resources.

The way Driving Hope's transportation network works is that when a partner organization has a client who is a victim of domestic violence and needs transportation, they call a volunteer dispatcher, who then contacts a pool of volunteer drivers. A driver volunteer agrees to give the ride and is given more details by the dispatcher. Driving Hope's partner organizations include Mercy Hospital, any domestic violence shelter in the region, CASA, ALIVE, the Franklin County Resource Board, law enforcement, Legal Services of Eastern Missouri, the county prosecutor's office, and others.

While driver safety is an enormous priority for Driving Hope, most of the rides are needed after a victim leaves their abuser and is making the transition back to a normal life. For example, they need a ride from a shelter to an attorney or counselor appointment. Driving Hope also has numerous safety protocols in place. For example, a victim is always required to walk from their apartment or house to a public location, like a gas station or store, to be picked up for a ride.

Driving Hope recently received American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to provide three cars for the transportation network and operating expenses for three years. As a result, when a volunteer agrees to give a ride, they will soon have the option of using their own vehicle and gas or, if they're more comfortable, using a Driving Hope vehicle. The vehicles will be parked in a few different communities at our partner organization's buildings. Driving Hope is fully insured.

To volunteer, an applicant must complete an application, undergo a background check, and complete a training session. A volunteer only has to commit to giving one ride a quarter or serve as a dispatcher for one day a quarter. Ideally, they can do more, but that's the minimum time commitment.



"Beyond the Wand: The Magic and Mayhem of Growing Up a Wizard " by Tom Felton

Flashback to late in the year of 1998. A new book has been

published that will end up greatly affecting the literary world and eventually the movie industry as well. It's the first book in what is to become a seven-book series. Harry Potter has been introduced to the world!

At that time, I was teaching language arts to 8th graders at Washington Middle School, and one of my students had her eyes glued to a book all hour called Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone by J.K. Rowling. This was not normal behavior for this particular student, as she was a reluctant reader. Intrigued, I asked her about the book, and when she described the plot, I was hooked.

It is now 2022, and I have read each of the novels and watched the films over a dozen times. When I heard that Tom Felton, the actor who portraved the iconic role of bad boy Draco Malfoy in the movies, had written a biography called Beyond the Wand, I couldn't wait to put a hold on it through the library. Tom delivers a fascinating look into his life as a "normal" kid: the youngest of four brothers in a tight knit working-class family of Surrey, England, and how this transitioned into a career as a child actor. His tales of teenage rebellion (attempting to shoplift a DVD from a store, smoking both cigarettes and marijuana, etc.) are mainly the products of his deep desire for "normalcy" in the decade it would take to film the eight blockbuster movies based on the books. When he wrote about how he developed an understanding of his character, Draco Malfoy, it was a powerful moment. "There

were two sides to Draco's story: he was a bully, of course, but at heart he was a little boy who was terrified of his dad."

Tom's biography is full of humor, behind the scenes moments in the filming of the movies (these being some of my favorite parts), his close relationships with the actors, particularly Emma Watson (Hermione) and crews, and his life after the Harry Potter series ended. He struggled greatly with his fame and substance abuse after moving to California. He ends the book showing how his life has changed for the better with his understanding of his mental health issues.

This book may not be for everyone, especially if they have not read the Harry Potter books nor seen the movies. For those of us Muggles who have, it is a magical look into the life and soul of Tom Felton and his alter ego, Draco Malfoy.

and her house surrounded by police officers, she reacts as anyone would and gives them her name. But instead of helping her, the police immediately become hostile and arrest her, asking her what her husband has been doing in the garage- which serves as her husband's workshop and is a place she never enters.

What's in the workshop, you may

ask? Well, it turns out Gina's wonderful, supporting husband is a serial killer, and now she has been arrested as an accomplice and given the nickname "Melvin's Little Helper." Sound intense? This is the first chapter.

Four years later, we meet Gwen Proctor, formerly known as Gina Royal. However, Gwen is nothing like Gina. Where Gina was a submissive housewife, Gwen is strong, in control, and on a mission to protect her children and their life from online stalkers and trolls whose sole focus is to track them down. With little help from anyone, Gwen has provided herself and her two children with new names, a new home, and a new life at Stillhouse lake.

Gwen believes her family has finally

found refuge in their new home at the remote lake and small town. Just when she begins to feel at home, a body is found in the lake, and threatening letters start arriving.

This book was thrilling from beginning to end, and one thing is sure - Gwen can't trust anyone at Stillhouse Lake.

demographic while praising what the library offers in our communities.



Historical Marker Placed at St. Clair Branch

The St. Clair Historical Museum has placed a historical marker in front of the St. Clair branch to mark the site as the location of the first building built in the town. The building was a 13-room inn and tavern with a livery stable named Traveler's Repose. The building became an official Post Office on July 8, 1843. The postal name changed to St. Clair in 1859 when the Southwest Branch of the Pacific Railroad arrived nearby. The building was last known as the Conn Lacy Saloon, which burned in 1927.
