

Annual Community Read Kicks Off March 24

Scenic Regional Library, Washington Public Library, and East Central College will kick off their fifth annual community read in March. The community read aims to foster connections within our communities and spark meaningful discussions by encouraging as many people as possible to read the same book.

This year's book is "The Flower Sisters" by Missouri author Michelle Collins Anderson. The historical fiction novel was inspired by the true story of the Bond Dance Hall explosion in West Plains, Missouri, on April 13, 1928. 
Beginning on Monday, March 24, the library and its partners will be giving away over 1,300 free copies of the "The Flower Sisters," which were purchased through the Neighborhood Reads bookstore in Washington. The books will be distributed on a first-come, first-serve basis while supplies last. E-book and e-audiobook copies will also be available for check-out through the library's digital services.

The community read also includes a variety of programs throughout April centered around the themes of the book. Some of these great programs include:

- Cherry & Jerry Live: With Isaac Cherry on percussion and Jerry Rabushka on piano, this duo will entertain with wonderful tunes from the era of ragtime, early blues, and jazz.
- 50 Years of Fashion and Social Influence: Christine Miller and Louise Hermes lead an in-depth discussion on women's fashion from 1890-1930, featuring authentic garments that highlight style and cultural significance.
- Glittersby Murder Mystery Party: Calling all masters of mystery, we want your help to solve a murder at Jay Glittersby's mansion! Actors and sleuths are needed.
- Jazz Band Concerts: Experience the vibrant energy and talent of your local community high school jazz band in an unforgettable performance.
- Learn to Dance the 1920's Way: Grab your dancing shoes and join us to learn the Charleston. No experience necessary!
- **Prohibition with Pinckney Bend**: Explore the Prohibition Era and sample iconic spirits of the 1920's with Pinckney Bend Distillery.
- Roaring Twenties Escape Room: Travel to a time of speakeasies, jazz, and Al Capone. Teams of 4 will race to see who can solve the mystery first.

There will also be book discussions held at every branch and partner location. Overall, there will be 43 programs and 17 book discussions at Scenic Regional branches, Washington Public Library, and East Central College throughout the month, in addition to three visits by author Michelle Collins Anderson.

Celebrating St. Patrick's Day? Hoopla and Freegal Can Help!

St. Patrick's Day has been celebrated in America since 1601! The first St. Patrick's Day parade was held that year in St. Augustine, Florida—a Spanish colony at the time. Celebrations ramped up in the mid- to late-Nineteenth Century as Irish immigrants flooded the United States and created their own identity as Irish Americans.

The most important ingredients for a great St. Patrick's Day celebration are food and music. You may be surprised to learn that the library can help.

Irish music is a must for St. Patrick's Day. The library's digital music platform, Freegal, has hundreds of Irish songs. You'll find music from legendary Irish bands like:

- The Dubliners
- The Chieftains
- The Pogues
- The Clancy Brothers

If you haven't listened to these bands, you're missing out. A proper St. Patrick's Day celebration isn't complete without listening to classic songs like the Irish Rover, Whisky in a Jar, and many others.

You can stream music from Freegal for eight hours every day—plenty of time to celebrate—on your Smartphone or other mobile device. You can create playlists on Freegal, so you may want to jump on today and begin adding songs for the big day.

Our digital music is completely free with a library card. You can find Freegal by visiting https://scenicregional.org/virtual-library/download-stream/#eMusic. There's even a free app.



"Missouri Masters" Opens at the Gallery at the Library



he Gallery at the Library at the Hemann branch kicked off a new exhibit entitled "Missouri Masters" with an opening reception on Friday, March 7, from 6:00 to 8:00 PM. The show will run from March 7 to May 23 and is free and open to the public. The exhibit is sponsored by Hermann Lumber and Strassner Furniture.

The exhibit features internationally recognized Missouri artists Bryan Haynes, Billyo O'Donnell, Hans Droog, Gary Lucy, and Michael Bauermeister.

Bryan Haynes draws on the legacy of 1930's painters like Thomas H. Benton and Grant Wood. He has created murals and large-scale paintings for a variety of prestigious clients, including The Kauffman Foundation in Kansas City, The Missouri Botanical Garden's permanent collection, The Westward Expansion Memorial Museum at the Arch, Arrowhead Stadium, The Missouri History Museum, and Edward Jones. Haynes has also been commissioned for artwork by global companies such as Disney, Estée Lauder, Warner Brothers, Universal Studios, IBM, Nike, Sony Music, and Anheuser-Busch. The Bryan Haynes Studio and Gallery is in Washington.

Hans Droog is renowned for a diverse body of work including paintings, intricate metal and wood sculptures, and handcrafted furniture, all deeply inspired by the landscapes of the Midwest, Southwest, and Colorado. He gained recognition for his wildlife sculptures and paintings, securing commissions from organizations such as John Deere, Ralston Purina, Anheuser-Busch, as well as private collectors. Droog expanded his artwork to include large-scale public metal sculptures and wood craftsmanship.


Billyo O'Donnell is recognized as one of America's top landscape painters, featured in the Sea to Shining Sea exhibit at the Haggin Museum in Stockton, California. In 2013, Billyo was invited to the White House to create an ornament for the national Christmas tree. A member of the Plein Air Painters of America since 2013, Billyo has participated in cultural exchanges in China and exhibited across the U.S.

Michael Bauermeister is a distinguished sculptor and wood artist. His art is held in prestigious collections such as the Smithsonian's Renwick Gallery, the Boston Museum of Art, and the United States State Department's Art in Embassies program. Bauermeister's work has been featured in major publications like American Craft and Woodturning, and he has completed notable commissions, including for the Emperor of Japan in 2018.

Gary Lucy's early career focused on wildlife art, earning him accolades such as winning the Missouri Duck Stamp competition. Later, he transitioned to historical interpretation, inspired by his observations along the Missouri River. One of his most notable projects was an exhibit at the old courthouse in St. Louis with over 35,000 visitors and featured on PBS. Lucy's original paintings for the exhibit have been reproduced over 265 million times worldwide. Lucy also had his work displayed at the State Historical Society of Missouri alongside famous Missouri artists George Caleb Bingham and Thomas Hart Benton. The Gary R. Lucy Gallery is in Washington.

Library Advocacy Day

he Missouri Library Association's annual advocacy day event was held on February 4 in Jefferson City. Librarians, library trustees, and citizens from around the state met with their local legislators to advocate for increased state library funding and legislation benefitting Missouri libraries. State funding for libraries includes direct state aid, MOREnet funding (which subsidizes the library's internet costs), and Athletes & Entertainers Tax funding for new materials. The Missouri annual budget and new legislation is approved by the legislature in early May.

Director Steve Campbell, Union branch manager Denise Chappell, Assistant Director Megan Maurer, Pacific branch manager Lori Jane Perdew, and Hermann branch manager Tiffany Richards represented Scenic Regional Library at the event. They met with local legislators, including State Senator Ben Brown and State Representatives Jeff Myers, John Simmons, Bruce Sassmann, and John Hewkin.

It's Time to Garden!

In Missouri, you can begin vegetable gardening early- to mid-March with cool-season vegetables like broccoli, cauliflower, cabbage, lettuce, onions, spinach, beets, carrots, radishes, and potatoes. If you've struggled to plant and maintain a successful vegetable garden in the past, the library has the resources to help. These are just some of the books in the library's collection to help you begin vegetable gardening, or improve your maybe-not-as-good-as-you'd-like vegetable gardening skills:

"Ultimate Gardening," by Gardening Know How

This practical guide covers every aspect of gardening, no matter where you live or what you want to grow, and easy-to-understand tips and colorful photos make this a great guide for beginners as well as those who want to expand their gardening skills. You'll learn how to lay out a plot, prepare the soil, rotate crops, fend off weeds and pests, and much more.



"Veg Out: A Stress-Free Guide to Creating Your First Vegetable Garden," by Heather Rodino [Also available as an e-book on Hoopla]

Gardening expert Heather Rodino teaches the basics of growing your own vegetables, such as how to choose the right plants for a climate and guarding the crop from hungry critters. Included are 30 profiles of beginner-friendly vegetables and herbs with detailed instructions on where to grow, when to harvest, as well as their sunlight, watering, and soil needs.

"GrowVeg: The Beginner's Guide to Easy Vegetable Gardening," by Benedict Vanheems [Also available as an e-book on Hoopla and Libby]

For anyone who has ever wanted to tend a little piece of ground but wasn't sure where to begin, "GrowVeg" offers simple gardening projects that are both attainable and beautiful. The beginner-friendly instructions and step-by-step photography detail more than 30 approachable, small-scale gardening projects that will inspire and empower you to get growing.

"The Vegetable Gardening Book: Your complete guide to growing an edible organic garden from seed to harvest," by Joe Lamp'l [Also available as an e-book on Hoopla]

The award-winning television and podcast host Joe Lamp'l provides insider tips and next-level insight for creating a lush, fruitful, and resilient vegetable garden. The book includes ideas for designing and laying out your garden for the greatest yields in the smallest amount of space; a plan for reducing maintenance and trimming down the traditional workload of a garden; a handy reference chart with an easy-to-follow crop rotation plan; and much more.

The StoryWalk™ consists of 16 signs along a one-mile walking trail. Each sign contains a page of a children's book. The project is a partnership between the Owensville Friends of the Library, Owensville Parks & Recreation



Department, and Scenic Regional Library. The Owensville Friends of the Library and Owensville Parks & Recreation Department shared the project's cost. The library updates the StoryWalk™ signs with pages from a new book every three months.

The StoryWalk™ promotes early literacy, exercise, and family time together in nature. It's a fun and educational family activity that can bring joy to the community as people take a stroll and enjoy successive pages from a children's story along the path.


