
Summer Reading Program Begins June 1

Summer is quickly approaching, which means the Summer Reading Program is almost here! This year's theme is Oceans of Possibilities. The program, which begins June 1, will have reading challenges, prizes, and programs for all ages. Kids will keep track

of how many minutes they read and record it on a game board, and teens and adults will complete fun challenges that include reading and other activities.

Those who complete the program will earn a completion prize- a book for kids and teens, and a tote bag for adults. Each participant will also have the chance to put their name into a drawing for additional prizes! Drawing prizes for kids and teens will include games, puzzles, sprinklers, etc. Adults will have the opportunity to put raffle tickets into the prize drawing of their choice. Prize baskets will vary between branches and will be sponsored by the Friends of the Library. There will also be three themed prize packages available to be won system-wide. The three themes are game night, outdoors, and relaxation.

Reading during the summer is essential for all ages, so keep reading. Don't forget- listening to books also counts!

Staff Spotlight: Denise Technology Manager, Administration



Can you describe your job, for those who may not be familiar with all you do behind the scenes? I manage the day-to-day technology necessities throughout the library system. This includes software (programs), hardware (computers and peripherals, servers, phones, etc.), networks, maintaining the website, and so much more. I repair what's "broken," maintain equipment, update computers (and firewalls, switches, servers, etc.), and replace equipment as needed.

What is your favorite part of the job? I truly enjoy helping people. If I can make things work more efficiently for someone else, that

makes my job incredibly rewarding. I also love those challenging issues that require a little extra thought to puzzle through -- they allow me to learn something new and I LOVE to learn daily!

What is the most challenging project you've worked on for the library? Currently, a new server and NAS (network-attached storage) solution for the library system that I was able to acquire on a grant. Previously, establishing all of the network connections, fiber installs, and setting up the data racks for all of the new branches as they were built.

What brought you to Scenic?

I have always been drawn to books and libraries. I was a reader from an early age and even worked in the library in junior high school. When I saw the position advertised in my local branch (Owensville at that time), I applied immediately. I worked at the branch for several months, moved to headquarters to work with the IT manager for more than a year, and then assumed the Technology Manager position.

What do you wish more people knew about the library?

I would be remiss if I didn't mention the technology available at the library: public computer access, printing, copying, scanning, and fax services. We have flash drives available for sale at the circulation desk as well as lots of fun library merchandise. Libraries now are nothing like those of my childhood with shushing librarians... there's something for EVERYONE!

Outside the library, what do you do for fun?

Believe it or not, I am a newlywed... I was just married on Valentine's Day! I spend a lot of time with my family. We love to visit Kansas City to visit my daughter and enjoy other road trips as well. I enjoy scrapbooking, reading, cooking, and socializing with my new parish family at St. Bridget of Kildare in Pacific.

What are you currently reading/just finished/or reading next?

I always have several books going at the same time. I just finished The Last Days of Ptolemy Grey, am rereading Station Eleven, and am in the midst of several books on faith and Catholicism.



Tutor.com Announces Upgrades

I utor.com, a free service offered through the library, has announced a major upgrade to its Learning Suite for Libraries that provides our patrons with valuable SAT/ACT essentials. The new homepage provides links to resources such as posttest advice, expert-created videos and webinars, and a college planner tool. The new resource page provides articles on critical topics such as test anxiety, "good" SAT and ACT scores, and merit-based financial aid. The service also offers 20 total full-length practice tests- along with a handy timer tool and instant score calculation function, which gives students experience and greater confidence in the testing environment.

Tutor.com also allows you to chat with a tutor in real-time! Ask questions

Woman in Gold (DVD)

I have always been intrigued by the story of the "Monument's Men" and their journey to save priceless works of art, and culture, from the Nazis while risking their lives during World War II. Woman in Gold is the story of one of those works of art and it's return to its rightful owner Maria Altmann. This film is based on the true story of the legal fight that took nearly a decade between Maria Altmann and the Austrian Government to return Gustave Klimt's famous painting of her aunt Adele Block-Bauer titled Portrait of Adele Block-Bauer I, which was

stolen from her relatives by the Nazis, just before World War II.

"Devil House" by John Darnielle

A true crime author moves into a house that was the scene of a notorious 1986 double murder, intending to write his magnum opus about the crime. But he digs too deep and unearths secrets that were supposed to stay buried.

You think you know where this is going, but you don't.


The premise sounds like typical jump-scare horror movie territory, but it's not (although be aware there are explicit themes and plenty of gore.) Devil House has higher aims about the nature of art and the

responsibility of the artist.

Darnielle uses dual timelines and disorienting point-of-view shifts to tell multiple stories that don't seem, at first glance, to have anything to do with each other. This is very experimental fiction, and honestly, I didn't so much enjoy it as respect it for what Darnielle attempted to do. I still can't decide if I think he succeeded or not. The ending felt incomplete to me; I kept waiting for him to pull the rabbit out of the hat, but he never did. But after I gave it a couple days and thought back on it, maybe this was exactly the

I recommend Devil House for readers who don't mind a little ambiguity, and who enjoy horror tropes as well as literary fiction.
