






#### "Familyhood" by Paul Reiser

I found this book at our Spring Book Sale and thoroughly enjoyed it. The title intrigued me, and I have always loved this comedian/actor. If you have kiddos, I suggest reading it! It was heartfelt, magical, and just plain funny! Parenting can be pretty dang hard some days, other days, it is pretty wonderful-and I have felt a lot of the emotions in the stories the author described: watching your beloved dog get older and slowing down (this chapter was titled My Dog's Father!), living in the moment...yet still wanting to capture everything digitally so you can look back, embarrassing your kids, struggling with choosing the best school for your kids, juggling having a relationship with your friends while being too impossibly busy to do so. Parts of the book brought me to tears, and still others made

me laugh out loud. Also by Paul Reiser: "Couplehood" and "Babyhood".

#### "Caraval" by Stephanie Garber

"Come one, come all!"... this is the feeling behind the book "Caraval" by Stephanie Garber. She mixes fantasy and romance to create this sweeping YA novel you're sure to love! It all begins with magic- every year, in a faraway place, Legend, a legendary carnival master, invites a select group to come and play his Caraval game for a chance to win the prize: a granted wish. Every year, Scarlett Dragna hopes to be chosen. This year, she finally is and is accompanied by her sister and her sister's most recent beau... one whose dark eyes seem to look at Scarlett more than her sister. However, once her sister disappears upon arrival and her beau is always suspiciously in the wrong place at the wrong time, Scarlett wonders if there is more to the story this year than what meets the eye. After all, is it just a game?

The book "Caraval" drew me in from the very first page. It is the perfect mix of chaotic-carnival and fantasy-romance. Frankly, I found that once I picked it up, I simply couldn't put it down! I was dying to know: Who would win Caraval? Whose wish would be granted? And WHO is Legend? It twists and turns, magic seeping through, and leaves you wondering: is everything as it appears to be? Or could it all be more magical than it originally seems?

#### "Stitched & Sewn: The Life-Saving Art of Holocaust Survivor Trudie Strobel" by Jody Savin, photographs by Ann Elliott Cutting

This beautiful biography tells the true story of Holocaust survivor Trudie Strobel. In 1941, four-year-old Trudie and her mother, Masha, were seized from their home, in Russia, by the Nazis. Trudie's father had been taken three years earlier and had never been seen again. Trudie and her mother were driven north to Poland along with other Jews to experience the horror of concentration camps and labor camps.

The biography tells of the hardships the two experienced and of the one skill which saved them. Masha was an extraordinary seamstress and her sewing skills were sought out by the Nazi soldiers and others. Trudie was taught to assist Masha, and together, they survived in a labor camp until they were liberated in 1945, before Trudie's seventh birthday.

Trudie and Masha eventually came to America. They lived in Chicago where Trudie met Hans Strobel. They were married and raised two sons. When Trudie's sons were in their twenties and had moved out, Trudie experienced a dark period. She stopped functioning. She couldn't eat. She couldn't sleep. She didn't know where she was. This went on for several months before her husband, Hans, found a psychiatrist for her. Trudie was able to regain her life by using her sewing skills to tell her story and the story of the Jewish people.

The book "Stitched & Sewn" showcases some of Trudie's works which are now in public and private collections. Trudie has created extraordinary tapestries showing moments in Jewish time, distinguished Jewish women of achievement, the four seasons, and various Jewish holidays spent with her family. She hand-crafted 11 dolls dressed in costumes Jews were forced to wear to identify them as targets for discrimination. She has stitched yarmulkes for friends, family, and synagogues. She has crafted many more works to tell her story and the story of the Jewish people.

This is a wonderful testament to a courageous woman and people. It is well worth the short time it takes to read.

#### The Wishkeeper's Apprentice" by Rachel Chivers Khoo

Felix is just a kid. A part of an average family living in a small average town. But Felix is no ordinary kid. He has problems. The kind that can't be fixed with a hug or an extra helping of chocolate cake. Felix is the new kid. And to make matters worse, his best friend, his big sister, has started treating him like something she found under her sneaker.

Felix's problems seem almost unsolvable. Until one day, after a particularly drippy and disappointing soccer practice, Felix makes a wish. A big wish that will lead young Felix on an adventure. One that not only helps him find the answers to all these questions but the answers to so much more than he could possibly imagine. Felix finds out he is no average kid and his life is anything but ordinary.

I loved "The Wishkeeper's Apprentice" by the new author, Rachel Chivers Khoo. I found it as warm and as sweet as hot chocolate on a cold rainy afternoon. The writing transports you into a magical world from the first page, setting the tone for the whole book. The perfect read-aloud for kids or world-weary adults.

#### Owensville StoryWalk<sup>TM</sup> Now Open



The Owensville Memorial Park is officially home to a StoryWalk™, which consists of 16 signs placed along the walking trail. The ribbon cutting for the new feature of the park took place on August 19. The event featured speeches by Mayor Kevin McFadden, Parks Director Angela Lairmore, and Owensville branch manager Erica Mosley. The StoryWalk™ is a joint effort between the Owensville Friends of the Library and the Owensville Parks Department, with each contributing 50% of

the funding for the project.

The first story is The Napping House by Audrey Wood. StoryWalk™ promotes early literacy, physical activity, and family time together in nature. It's a fun and educational family activity that can bring joy to the community as people take a stroll and enjoy successive pages from a children's story along the path. StoryWalk™ Project was created by Anne Ferguson of Montpelier, VT, and developed in collaboration with the Vermont Bicycle & Pedestrian Coalition (VBPC) and the Kellogg Hubbard Library. StoryWalk® exists across the U.S. and worldwide in 13 countries including Germany, Canada, England, Bermuda, Russia, Malaysia, Pakistan and South Korea!
