"Our little Warren County, that most people would consider to be flyover country, really had so many important parts of history," Event Director Cathie Schoppenhorst said.

Schoppenhorst pointed out that some people don't know that Boone spent the last fourth of his life in Missouri.

"His role in bringing people here began the first significant settlements in this part of the country," she said.

Duden was instrumental in Germans immigrating to the area due to his 1829 "Report on a Journey to the Western States of North America." In the publication, he described

Missouri as idyllic and having inexpensive land for purchase and abundant resources.

The Celebrate Marthasville's Heritage festivities will begin at 10 a.m. April 27 with an opening ceremony.

After the opening ceremony, several speakers, such as Dr. Arthur Mehrhoff and Dr. Walter Kamphoerner, will give presentations on German heritage. Historical reenactors will portray Daniel and Rebecca Boone and performance troupes will perform cultural dances.

The Lichtenberg Park gazebo will feature musical acts including a zither duo and German bands. A tree and bench dedication ceremony will take place in memory of Loretta Davis, a woman who worked to beautify Marthasville, according to Schoppenhorst.

Activities like blacksmithing, wood processing, knife making, corn grinding and other demonstrations will take place at and around the Katy Trailhead.


The Preserve Marthasville building will feature children's games, quilt displays, raffles, books, toys and other
