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first-year teacher. It's a new system, and to integrate all the products is challenging. Every day we learn about a new issue and do our best to solve that as quickly as we can."

One unforeseen need may have been a command center or response system for fielding questions and concerns from those using the virtual model. R-III has employed Canvas as an online portal and is using Google Classroom as a transmission method for assignments and lessons.

"Something that has taken us by surprise was the support for people at home when they have said technical issues," Klinginsmith. "We don't have a call center or tech For families and students concerned about being adversely impacted by technical barriers outside of their control, Klinginsmith says communication with teachers about those challenges is paramount.

"Grace and understanding is the theme of this year," said Klinginsmith. "We've got a whole new platform we're launching. There are going to be issues, and we're all learning together. As long as there is communication on legitimate technical issues, we'll work with the kids."

The highest percentage of virtual learners are at the high school, with 339 students taking at least one online class. Black Hawk Middle School has 244 students enrolled in at least one virtual class.

For those attending school via the traditional body. There's been no issues with mask compliance at all. Kids have been respectful of teachers and administrators, and we very much appreciate their cooperation.

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Students in the third grade and above, as well as all staff, are required to wear masks until R-III is advised otherwise by the Warren County Health Department.

Periods such as lunch or recess provide a chance for students to temporarily remove face coverings.

"If the student is further than 6 feet away, we do give kids an opportunity to have mask breaks as long as they're able to keep their distance and are outside that range," said Klinginsmith.
