the opportunity to learn at their own pace while receiving the same instruction and content as those learning in-person. Virtual learners will not be required to attend sessions at the same time as in-person peers but are encouraged to develop a routine.

"They could learn either synchronous or A-synchronous," said Klinginsmith. "The expectations we have for both teachers and students is that teachers upload content and students do independent practice with the work."

Teachers have started a bit earlier than usual preparing their classrooms for the return of students — many of whom were last in a classroom five months ago, when school was abruptly cancelled during March as a remask, we'll definitely be able to provide that," said Klinginsmith."

Additional means of social distancing will be the spacing out of desks where possible and the delivery of meals to the classroom.

"Those are going to be the big differences — not having mass gatherings or bringing the student body together for assemblies. We'll be contained to the classroom and not having big groups, Klinginsmith said.

R-III is focused on limiting the number of non-students and staff in the building this semester, presenting some unique challenges for

back-to-school traditions in which parents accompany elementary students to class.

"We do understand how important it is for dents could be tacing considerable social-emotional deficits after being away from the school setting for five months. It's anticipated those needs must be addressed for at least some time before establishing a learning routine.

"We've been doing a tremendous amount of study over the past few years on trauma informed," said Klinginsmith. "We'll rely on that training to provide support for students and will work closely with teachers and counselors."

R-III will continue with its four-day school weeks this year, with classes beginning at 7:40 a.m. and ending at 3:15 p.m.
