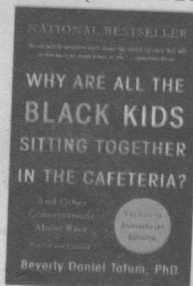

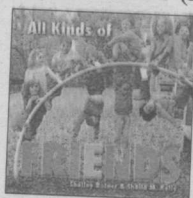


“Americanah,” by Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie
