"At the end of the day, I am very happy with what we've got," he stated.

Harrison added that one of the notable upgrades are the padded observation cells for in-

Some minor work remains in the new areas, but other than that Harrison said what's left is to deep-clean the old housing units. As inmates are shifted into the new dorms, the sheriff plans to begin a rotation of temporarily emptying the old housing units, power washing them and repainting.

operates at a surplus through state and federal payments, neither of those come close to paying for the expansion project or even normal operations. The jail does receive reimbursement for inmates accused of violating state laws, and receives additional funding to house a small number of federal prisoners. But Harrison said that revenue only accounts for about 33 percent of the

jail's operating budget.

PARK

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The city and members of the public will have an early chance to review and comment on the engineering plans. The general shape of the park designs are scheduled to be submitted in August 2020.

Initial plans for the park will include at least one full-size baseball field and full-size soccer field, along with other fields of varying sizes, according to the engineering contract. The exact number will depend on topography surveys.

The first phase of development would also include a 2,500-feet extension of Wildcat Drive northward across the length of the park. It would intersect with another new road along the northern boundary of the park connecting neighborhoods to the east and west.

A pavilion, restrooms, lighting, parking and utilities would all be included in engineering for the initial phase of development. Plans also will include the water, sewer

and electric utilities to serve the park.

Most of the early development will be limited to the southern area of the park. Future development, including playgrounds, more athletic fields, pavilions and walking trails, will be outlined in the master plan submitted by Bax Engineering.

Wright City purchased land for the park in 2018 for about \$1.2 million. Money for the purchase and for future development came from the sale of the city's water and sewer utilities for \$10.5

million.
